

To Know What is in Your Heart

Heb 3:10 — “Therefore I was angry with this generation, and said ‘They always go astray in their heart...’” (today was a good opportunity for us to go astray in our hearts) “...because they have never known My ways.” People who don’t know His ways will go astray and never enter into His rest.

Dt 8:1-3 — “*that He might humble you, testing you.*” Why did He humble them and test them? “So, *that you would know what’s in your heart.*” We have to know and understand what is in our hearts. “*And He humbled you and let you be hungry.*” Here’s what happened: they hungered, they got into all kinds of trouble, right from the start. They could have gone straight to the Red Sea, but they went forty miles out of the way, and then that meant Pharaoh’s army caught up with them. They could have said, “Look what you’ve done to us, leading us the wrong way, and now Pharaoh’s army is upon us.” But our Father let it happen so *that* the sea would open up and Pharaoh’s army would come and follow in and be drowned, and they would say “WOW!” and never doubt again. But as soon as hunger came, they doubted and wanted to go back to Egypt and things like this all the time.

The things we think are breaking us are really making us, so we have to give thanks. They didn’t have to go through that hardship; our Father could have floated them in on a cloud and blasted all the enemies out of the way, but He didn’t. You can look at verse 9 — it was a good land, but the minute they saw the giants they forgot everything they had heard, all the faith they had. They looked away and didn’t keep their eyes on our Father. We have to know what’s in us so that Israel won’t take it into the land. We have to judge ourselves because we can’t take it into the kingdom. We crucify things in Yahshua’s name. We kick it out so we can enter rest. Avivah had it tough today. What she went through was worse (to her) than what the children of Israel went through. It was worse than moving all those bricks and then not getting them. What she went through was a giant to her. You can’t compare what we go through. It tested her heart. We go through troubles every day in the kitchen and it really tests us, but other people are being tortured. They are being burnt at the stake, but our beans overcooked and we call it a terrible testing!

We can laugh at what happened today. We can’t challenge our Father and say, “You did something wrong!” That’s testing our Father. You can’t shine Him over. He’s beyond that. You can’t be more clever than Him. You can only surrender and say ‘Thank you.’ Surrender your opinion and then rebuke the accuser who accuses the brethren.

We are going to have to keep the evil one out of our circle. So many times we bring him into the minchah and he just laughs at us, as if our prayers were going to be heard! We cast out the evil one; we cast out doubt, the doubt that comes from the unseen realm.

In 1 Cor 10:11 it says they went through all these things as an example for us so that we would not fall. In Hebrews it says they were at the end of the age, but it’s prophecy concerning us. Paul probably thought he was at the end of the age, but we are. The first Edah fell as Israel fell, as you can see in Dt 8. We can’t be taken in by the schemes of the evil one. We have to cast the evil one out.

Speaking to Asher ben Jehu aged 11 who had spoken earlier) The Holy Spirit is with you now, but He will be in you. It’s so wonderful the revelation you and that you are able to speak what you hear. It’s a wonderful example.
